Emphasis is on drama in education and will prepare a student to "stand and deliver" the CNMI Standards and Benchmarks in Drama, and to show how drama can be used as a teaching medium. F. Course Activities and Design

The students will practice mime and improvisational skills. There will be a concentration on physical and vocal presentation as well as characterization within the framework of short improvised scenes. While learning this, the students will also learn how to apply these basic drama concepts, vocabulary, production and performance skills, in the elementary school classroom.
