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Course: EN 070 Beginning English: Speaking and Listening

2. Purpose

EN 070 is designed to provide basic English skills for beginning level students. Although the texts and approach integrate reading, writing, listening, and speaking, the emphasis is on developing speaking and listening skills in order for the student to achieve basic communicative competence in English. Students without any skills in English are unable to pursue academic coursework at NMC. These students need to acquire basic English skills before they can reach the level of competence necessary to succeed in college courses.

D. Catalogue Course Description

This is a beginning-level intensive ESL class for students with very limited English listening and speaking skills. Supplemental lab work is required and is assigned by the instructor.

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E. Degree or Certificate Requirements Met by Course None

F. Course Activities and Design

Students work through two competency-based textbooks and a workbook which provide integrated activities. Audio tapes supplement each competency in the text, and video tapes reinforce concepts covered in class. Activities are structured to allow ample opportunities for listening and speaking practice.

To facilitate communication, the instructor's approach will incorporate activities such as role plays, songs, simulations, two-way tasks, and simple problem-solving activities which require students to work together in groups or pairs.

Educational Enrichment Center activities allow students to listen to spoken English on cassettes and work on related exercises to gradually improve their listening and speaking skills.

Instructional field trips are designed based on students' needs and provide students the opportunity to use speaking and listening skills in real-life contexts.

4. Course Prerequisite(s); Concurrent Course Enrollment; Required English/Mathematics Placement Level(s)

Prerequisites: None

English Placement Level: This class is designed for students who test below 38 on the Listening Section of the NMC Placement Exam. It is recommended that students with aggregate scores below 380 on the NMC Placement Exam take this class along with EN 071.

Students who do not take the English Placement Exam must take EN 070/EN 071.

5. Estimated Cost of Course; Instructional Resources Needed

Cost to the Student: Tuition for a six-credit course, textbooks, and lab and materials fees.

Cost to the College: Instructor's salary.

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Instructional resources needed for this course include chalk and chalkboard, TV/ VCR and videotapes, tape recorder and audio tapes, overhead projector and transparency sheets, notebook computer and digital projector. The NMC Educational Enrichment Center has its own printed materials, kits, and computer software to enhance student learning.

6. Method of Evaluation

Students will receive on-going evaluation during the semester through classroom and homework exercises, peer interaction, and periodic quizzes. Final evaluation will be based on each student's abilities as demonstrated through classroom activities and on two post-tests, the NMC English Proficiency Exam and the SLEP. Students should score above 38 on Part One (Listening) of the NMC Proficiency Exam and demonstrate significant improvement on the Listening Section of the SLEP. NMC's grading and attendance policies will be followed.
